The 'Imperial' table, patented by Gillows in 1804, allowed for a variable number of loose leaves to be fitted between fixed end leaves upon a telescopic action. Initially these tables incorporated as many as twelve legs to support the central leaves, in addition to extra legs that could be screwed in as required, however as the design and mechanisms were refined, the central legs were gradually removed. In all related designs, the sitters' knees are accommodated by setting back the legs and from the 1820s and onwards, the Imperial table had risen to such popularity that it was almost exclusively the only dining table the firm manufactured and sold. James Wyatt succeeded Robert Adam as the 'most fashionable architect' and 'the first in his line' after the opening in 1772 of the Pantheon in Oxford Street, London that Wyatt had designed. Horace Walpole declared it 'the most beautiful edifice in England'. Wyatt then became the dominant figure while Adam received no significant country house commissions after 1774. Wyatt was also an accomplished designer of furniture and, working in the neoclassical style

would design a complete room down to the smallest detail (John Martin Robinson, *James Wyatt Architect to George III*, London, 2011, pp. 13 - 57 and 144 - 165). Remarkably similar designs to those of Wyatt have been attributed to known designers such as Hepplewhite. He also designed furniture for the Lancaster firm of Gillows.

Wyatt's significant addition to the north side of Badger Hall included a large dining room, library, staircase, drawing room and bedrooms. The present table or sideboard, in its original form, was designed and supplied by Wyatt for the dining room of Badger Hall, Shropshire. The design of the original sideboard is close to designs in the Wyatt/ Penrose Collection.

These exceptional commodes, veneered in beautifully figured West Indian Satinwood, have indented and rounded columnar corners, in the French manner introduced to the Prince of Wales' Carlton House mansion in the 1780s, and illustrated in Thomas Sheraton's, The Cabinet and Upholsterer's Drawing Book, 1793. In his Appendix (plate IV) discussing pier tables 'for ornaments under a glass', he notes 'they are generally made very light, and the style of finishing them is rich and elegant. Sometimes the tops are solid marble, but most commonly veneered in rich satin, or other valuable woods, with a cross-band on the outside'.

A satinwood and painted cabinet with similar French corners and taper-hermed legs, has been attributed to Messrs. Seddon, Sons & Shackleton (C. Gilbert, 'Seddon, Sons & Shackleton', Furniture History, 1997, fig. 27).

The engravings on the offered lot depict attractive scenes of rural life, such as feature in the paintings of James Ward, R.A. (1769-1859).

A number of related "hollow-fronted" dressing tables by Gillows are known with minor variations on the firm's early 19th century sketch. Several tables were supplied in 1813 to William Powlett, 2nd Baron Bolton (d.1850), for Hackwood Park, Hampshire, invoiced at £16 16s each. One of these was sold by order of The Executors of the 2nd Viscount Camrose, Christie's house sale, Hackwood Park, 20-22 April 1998, lot 364 (£47,700) and another from the same estate very similar to the offered lot sold Christies Important English Furniture, 8th July 1999 Lot 73, (£62,000).

The firm recorded at 22 St. Paul's Churchyard, and thereafter, 8 Old Bond Street, London, who described themselves as the 'Manufactory and Magazine for fashionable Furniture', attracted the patronage of the Royal Family, including the Prince of Wales (later George IV) at Carlton House, London. In May 1799 members of the Royal Family visited his showrooms and 'did Mr. Oakley the honour of viewing his Furniture Warehouse in New Bond Street'. 

This rare table is designed in the early 19th Century 'antique' manner with plinth-supported ends, of inverted-lyre scroll form centred by a medallion, both deriving from a library table illustrated in Thomas Hope's Household Furniture and Interior Decoration, London, 1807 and from engravings of the celebrated marble 'tomb of Agrippa'.

The combination of exotic timbers and the unusual striking design may point to an intriguing possible Anglo Indian origin.

Thomas Hope (1769-1831) was influential as a designer, design reformer and collector. A Dutchman, born in Amsterdam, Hope inherited from his family a tradition of collecting as well as vast wealth from the family bank. He was a collector on a grand scale and also an innovative designer of great genius who helped define what we understand as the Regency style.

His extensive Grand Tour travels in Europe, Greece, Turkey and Egypt inspired his interest in antiquities as a source of designs for Regency interiors, furniture and metalwork. He was determined to reform contemporary taste by returning architecture and the arts, including interior design and furniture, to what he conceived as the spirit of classical purity.

In 1799 he bought a house designed by Robert Adam in Duchess Street, Portland Place, London, which he remodelled with a series of themed interiors. The colourful interiors of Duchess Street and of Hope's country house, Deepdene in Surrey, played a unique role in the history of collecting, interior design and display. Both were open to select visitors, but his furniture reached an even wider public through his book, Household Furniture and Interior Decoration. Published in 1807, this book introduced the term 'interior decoration' into the English language.



John Whittaker's production of the folios of this series was undertaken in total secrecy with no one allowed to see or know how he produced the final mixed media prints. The undertaking was so time consuming, and expensive that it bankrupted him and consequently few examples of the work were ever made.







William Robert Colton RA was a British sculptor, born in Paris who after studying at the Lambeth School of Art enrolled in the Royal Academy where he was taught by Henry Armstead and Sir Joseph Boehm. During a successful career that involved royal commissions in India and England, as well as busts, statues and was memorials, he became a professor at the Royal Academy, president of the Royal British Society of Sculptors and full member at the Royal Academy.

This work earned him election as an associate of the Royal Academy. A version in marble is held in The Tate museum (Presented by the Trustees of the Chantrey Bequest 1903, N01928). The gallery label for the work notes the unusual choice of depicting the children on water and comments that this notion may have been inspired by Charles Kingsley's novel 'The Waterbabies' of 1863. It would seem that this is a plaster working for the second state of his composition as the plaster group exhibited in 1902 featured two girls not, as here and as at The Tate, a girl and a young boy. John Wood was a sculptor mainly of mythological and biblical subjects, and also portrait busts. Born in Warrington, Lancashire in 1839, he adopted Warrington as his middle name to distinguish himself from the older sculptor John Wood (1801-70). After training as a stonemason, he moved to Rome in 1865 where he studied under John Gibson. His success afforded him the wealth to purchase the Villa Campana. He exhibited works at the Royal Academy of Arts from 1868 to 1884 including a version of this sculpture in the 1879 Royal Academy Exhibition, catalogue No. 1509, which was displayed in the Central Hall.

In 1877 he was elected to the Guild of St. Luke in Rome and his statues of Raphael and Michelangelo stand at the entrance to the Walker Art Gallery in Liverpool with further work in Manchester Town Hall and in the museum and art gallery in Warrington.

Another version of this work, dated 1871, is currently exhibited at the Kibble Palace, Glasgow Botanic Gardens, Glasgow, Scotland.




