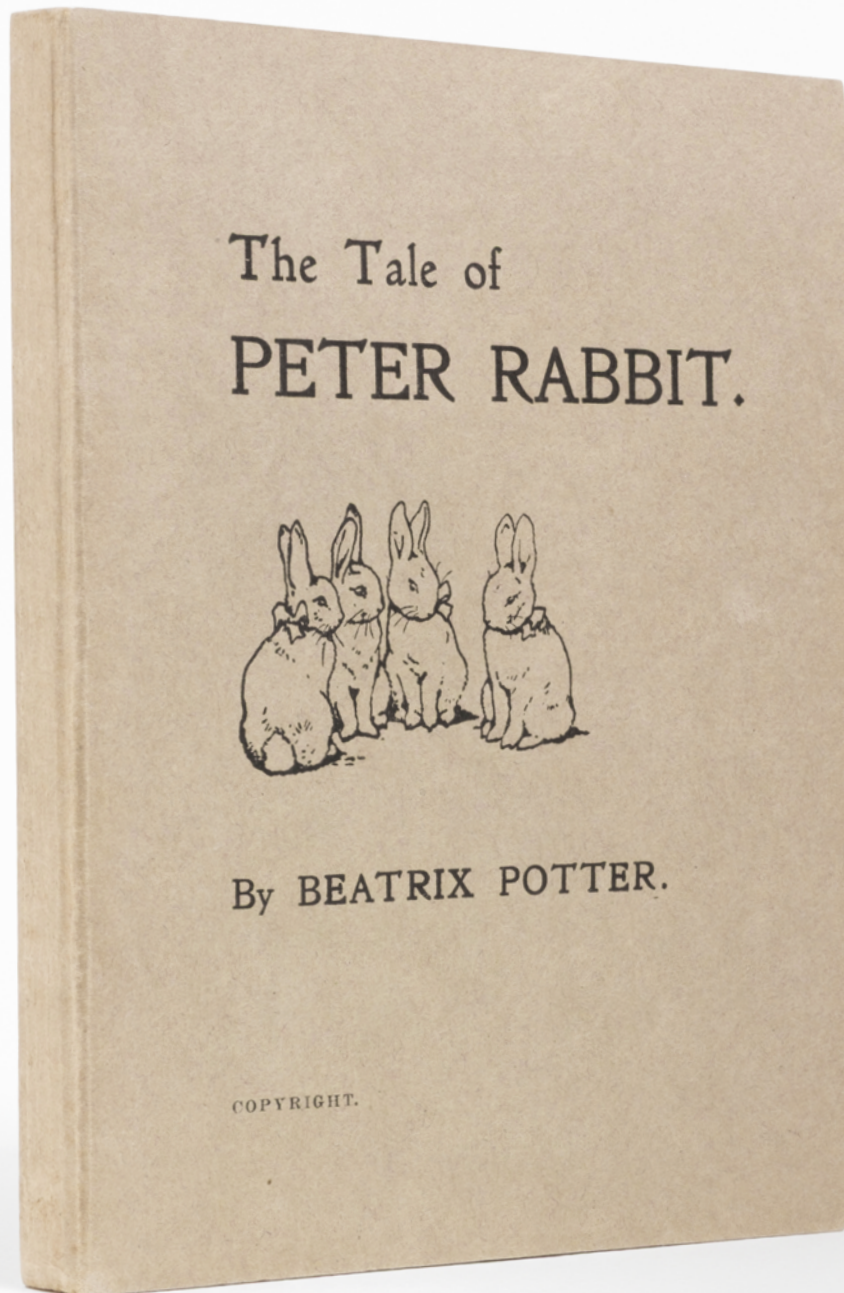

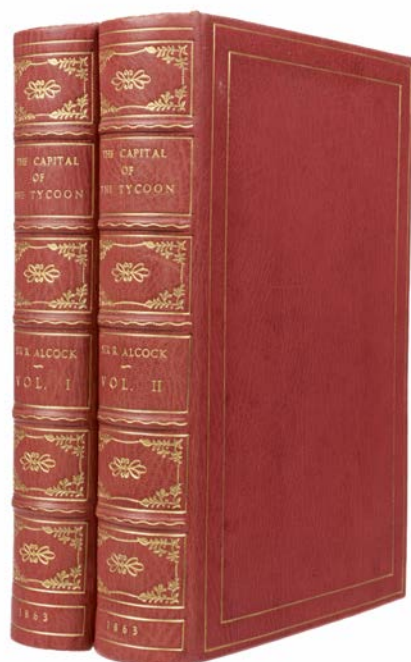

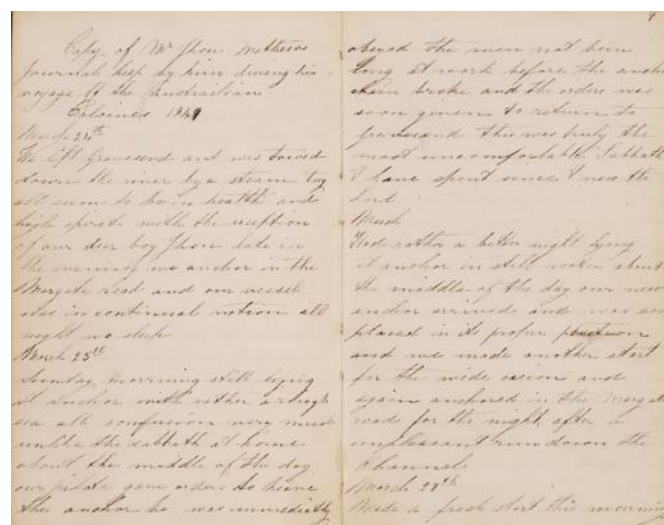

5* **Australian Diary.** Copy of Mr Jhon Matheias [John Matthews] Journal kept by him during his voyage to the Australian Colonies, 1849, 78 pp. handwritten transcript (by an unknown hand, probably a close female relative) of John Matthews's diary of his life aboard the ship *Larpent* on a voyage from Gateshead to Port Phillip, passing through the west coast of Africa, the Indian Ocean and settling in Geelong, on the outskirts of Melbourne, entries span from March 24th to June 29th 1849, and recount details including the births and deaths of fellow passengers, issues with the employed chaplain, encounters with other ships, fishing and disastrous storms; 'We have had another death during the night, [a] little child with inflammation of the Chest. I forgot to mention we had a birth on board at the commencement of the voyage, the Mother and Child are both done well, the Child his name is George Larpent' (April 11th), when encountering the passengers on another ship, Matthews states '[the passengers] paid 21 pounds and have everything provided and brought to them but have no land given them...., [they were] not so clean and peaceable..., drunkenness is very common amongst them, some of the women are nearly naked, [their] conduct and behaviours was any thing but virtue' (April 26th), while in the Indian ocean; 'some of our passengers have been expressing a wish to see a good storm as they called it and they have this day here favoured with one..., it carried away our top sail and also tore our main sail into shreds' (June 3rd) and finally arriving in Australia; 'went this morning to view the land flowing with milk and honey' (June 29th) and 'beautiful scenes that presents itself..., is beyond expression' (June 28th), finally settling in Geelong, signing off the entries 'To all love in affection John, The Black Bull Inn, Geelong', plus various verses of prose and poetry of the transcriber's own invention, 185 pp. in total, plus 18 pp. of separately bound additional sheets of verse also in the same hand, all in ink in a neat hand, contemporary morocco notebook, with monogram 'MSS' in gilt to upper cover, upper cover detached, spine with loss, 8vo (18.5 x 11.5 cm)

The *Larpent* was a migrant ship that arrived in Australia in 1849, bringing 210 people after a 91-day journey from England. These passengers were part of the Presbyterian minister Dr. John Dunmore Lang's colonisation plan for Western Victoria. Many eventually made their homes in the area that came to be known as the Larpent district, named after the ship itself.

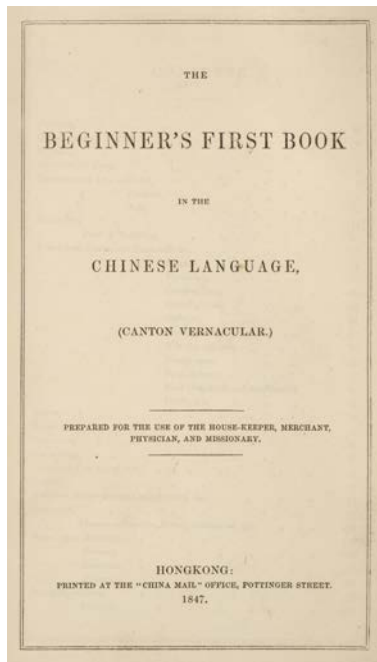

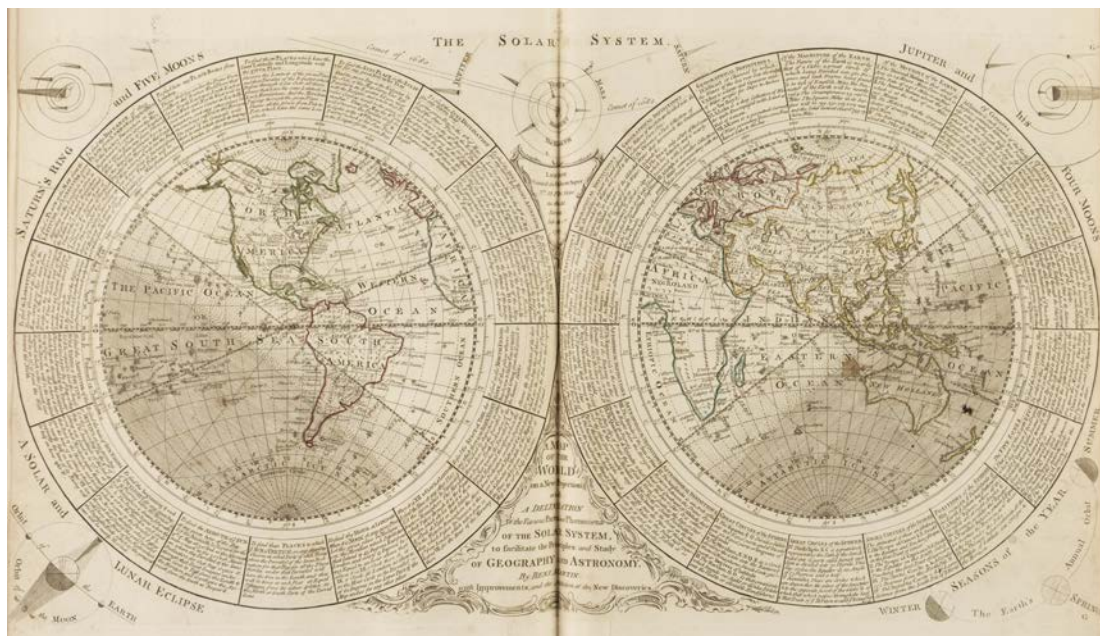

Thomas T. Devan (1809-1890), an American Baptist medical missionary who arrived in the newly-established British colony of Hong Kong in 1844, published his *Beginner's First Book in the Chinese Language* for the use of housekeepers, merchants, physicians and missionaries in South China, covering Cantonese grammar, medicine, and religion, to aid Western medical missionaries (like himself) in communicating with the Cantonese. The text is divided into sections covering numbers, divisions of time, relations of life, buildings, furniture, dress, and food, under which English entries are aligned with Chinese characters followed by Cantonese pronunciations. The work went through three editions.

Samuel Dunn was a hugely influential teacher of mathematics and navigation. He made great progress towards resolving the longitude problem and produced many charts of far eastern waters for the East India Company, for whom he worked for many years. Dunn published three editions of this work between 1774 and 1789. After his death, Robert Sayer took over the publication, and later, it was taken over by Laurie & Whittle; each time updated and improved to include the latest information.

The map was the primary exponent of the British position during the period immediately following the Treaty of Utrecht in 1713" (Degrees of Latitude). The large vignette gives the map its popular name, the 'Beaver Map'. This shows an early view of Niagara Falls, with a colony of beavers at work in the foreground. The fur from the beaver was an important component of the fur trade and, coupled with its reputation as an industrious animal, was deemed an appropriate image to represent the nation as a whole. This issue has Moll's address as 'against Deverux Court in the Strand', an address he occupied from 1710 -1732 (Worms & Baynton Williams, *British Map Engravers*). The date on the inset map of Louisiana is 1712, and it retains the early imprint of 'Cherecies 3000 men'. 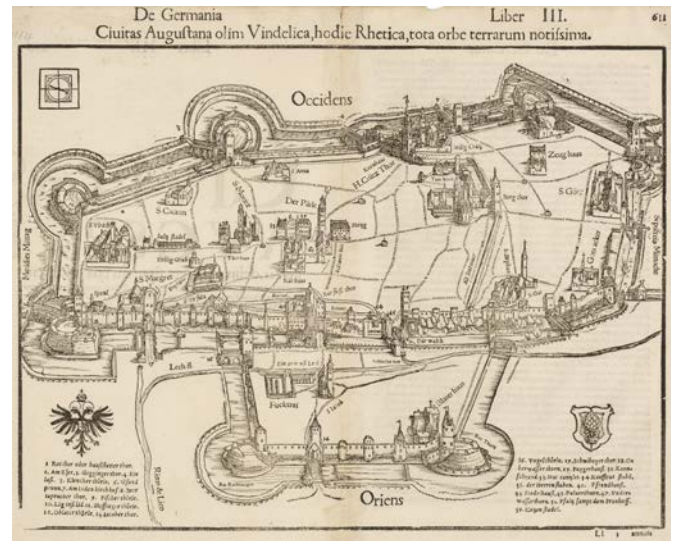

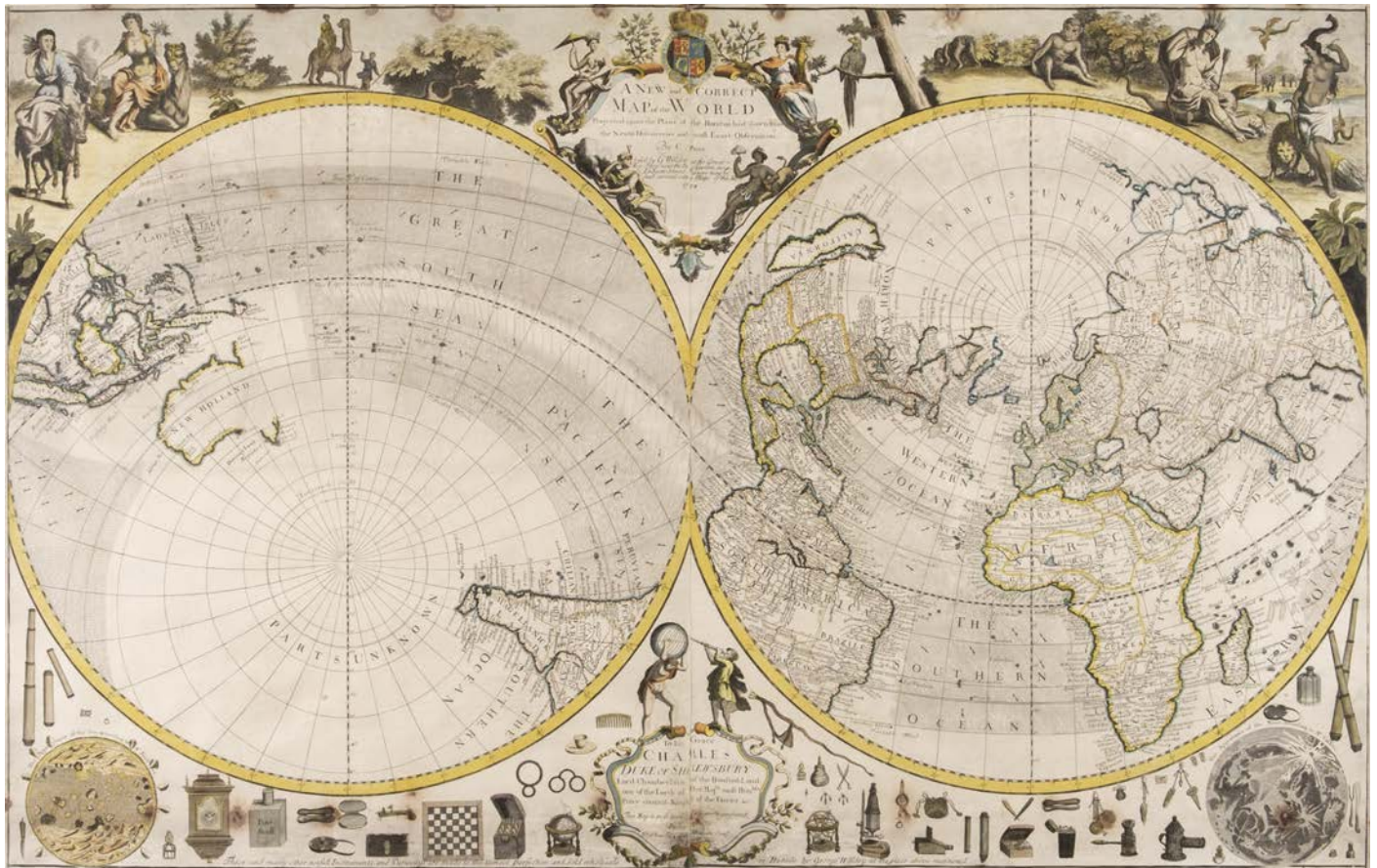

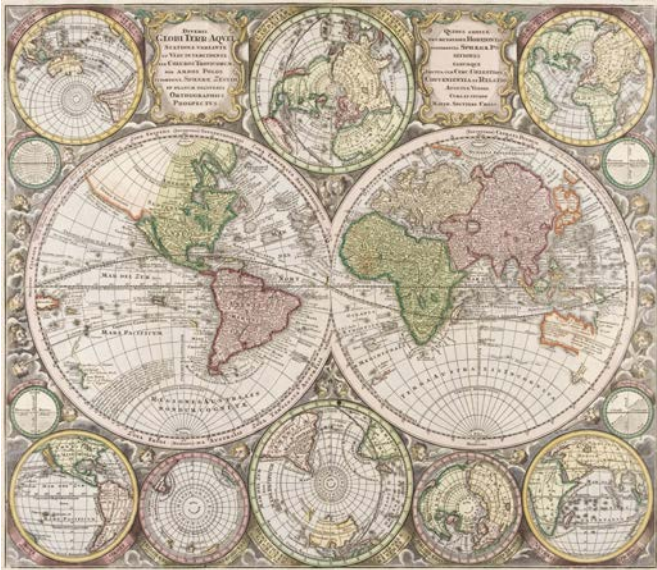

An extremely rare series of views in Barbados. Day & Haghe published a collection of lithographs of Trinidadian scenes in 1836, under the title *West India Scenery*, comprising 27 views by Richard Bridgens, produced in a format very similar to the present Barbados lithographs. Carter's series may have been an initial or competing project, ultimately set aside by the publishers in favour of Bridgens' more comprehensive *West India* collection. Given the extreme rarity of Carter's Barbados views, it seems likely that the project never reached completion.

The work is absent from all the standard bibliographies, including Abbey Travel, and it is not found in the Beinecke Lesser Antilles Collection at Hamilton College. No complete copy is recorded. The Wellcome Library holds a single plate (*Monument Near the Military Hospital*). No other plates are recorded in OCLC. We found four lithographs from the series sold in a U.K. auction in 2016, and an American dealer offering a collection of six lithographs from the series.

A rare map-themed caricature which alludes to the redrawing of the territorial boundaries of Europe after Napoleon's defeat at the Battle of Leipzig in 1813, the ensuing campaign in France, culminating in the occupation of Paris in March 1814 and Napoleon's abdication under the terms of the treaty of Fontainebleau in April 1814 and his subsequent exile to the Isle of Elba. The formal agreement for the redistribution of these territories was agreed at the Congress of Vienna in 1814 - 15.

A seated Napoleon, enthusiastically helped by the Duke of Wellington, 'regurgitates' all the territories that had been subsumed into his empire. Parts of France, the Netherlands, Poland, Italy, Germany and Spain gush forth and spread across the floor, falling into a large sack of 'spoils'. The King of Spain (who had been imprisoned by Napoleon) strides away in the lower left, carrying his repossessed lands and territories under his arm. The red-jacketed figure of Joachim Murat - the King of Naples - and Napoleon's brother-in-law holds a rolled-up map of Sicily, though the one marked Naples has slipped from his grasp. Murat would eventually be captured by the Allied forces and executed by a Firing squad in October 1815. The Austrian Emperor, kneeling by the sack, holds aloft the territory of the Low Countries, but already in his back pocket are the maps of Venice and Piedmont. Adjacent to the Emperor, the King of Prussia, Frederick William III, stoops to pick up the town of Erfurt, whilst maps of Switzerland and Rosbach protrude from his coat pocket. In the background, a French delegation including a likeness of Napoleon's former Justice Minister, de Cambacérès, and two comic acolytes exit the scene by the Porte de Derrière, a less than subtle reference to de Cambacérès' openly acknowledged homosexuality.

Though the caricature is listed in several French institutional collections, including the Bibliothèque Nationale, the Louvre, the Musée Carnavalet and the Musée de l'Armée, and copies are held by the Bodleian and the British Museum, it is rarely seen on the open market.

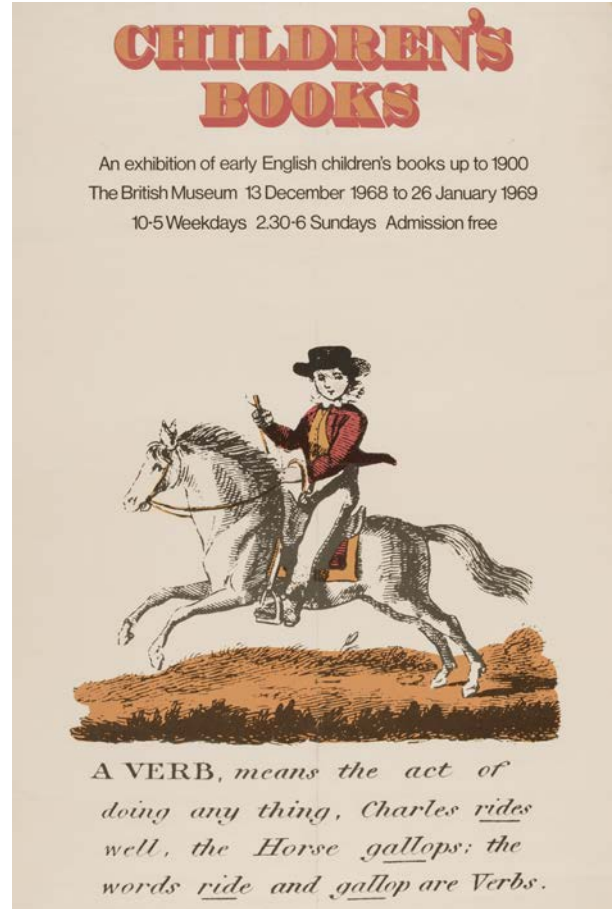

This uncommon map-themed Napoleonic caricature references supposed French military intentions to extend the European war to Bengal and British India. In 1801, the Russian Tsar Paul I proposed secret plans for a joint Franco-Russian expedition against British India, with the idea being resurrected in 1807 – 08. Napoleon had been fascinated by the Orient since an early age and was a great admirer of Alexander the Great and his vast empire, and ever since his expedition to Egypt in 1798, he had harboured plans to form alliances with many of the native Indian princes, most notably Tipu Sultan, with the idea of fostering rebellion and overthrowing the British administration in Bengal. Napoleon's ambitions were thwarted by skilful British diplomacy combined with lavish gifts and incentives, together with the East India Company agreeing to train and modernise the Persian army, and following a new treaty agreed in 1809, Britain blocked any chance of French troops invading British India through Persia.

Rare book of poems by a cousin of Jane Austen, James Henry Leigh, once owned by Leigh's grandson; only Oxford University located on COPAC, and no other copy traced at auction.

Jane Austen was related to the Leighs of Adlestrop Park and Stoneleigh Abbey through her mother, Cassandra Leigh. James Henry Leigh inherited Adlestrop Park in 1774 when he was only nine years old. His uncle and guardian, Reverend Thomas Leigh, was Cassandra Leigh's cousin, and he held the living of Adlestrop. The Austens were close to Reverend Leigh's family, and Jane Austen visited the Adlestrop estate at least three times: in 1794 for the first time, when she was 19; five years later, in 1799; and then in 1806, when she was 31. Much of what Jane experienced during her interactions with her Leigh relations was woven into her writings. Reverend Thomas, for example, employed Humphry Repton to landscape the grounds of Adlestrop, paying him five guineas a day, a detail Jane later wrote with great comic effect into *Mansfield Park*. One subject which is a recurring theme in Austen's novels is of course the thorny matter of inheritance, and one which came to the forefront during what one relative called the 'palpable scramble for Stoneleigh'. In fact, during the Austens' visit to Adlestrop of 1806, the subject of who was to inherit magnificent Stoneleigh Abbey was under hot debate, the Honourable Mary Leigh having just died. Reverend Leigh was the main contender to succeed, and he travelled with Mrs Austen and her two daughters to stay at the Abbey. On arrival Jane's mother counted the windows of the west front - much like Mr Collins, who in *Pride and Prejudice* tells Lizzy Bennet how many windows Rosings has. Mrs Austen and her two unmarried daughters had great hopes that the distribution of wealth from Stoneleigh would benefit them, but alas, despite there being riches on an almost unimaginable scale - and Stoneleigh under the stewardship of Reverend Leigh and his nephew James Henry became even more prosperous - Jane and her sister did not receive a penny. Constance Karslake (1880-circa 1940) was the daughter of London bookseller and Hampstead Bindery owner Frank Karslake (1851-1920) who founded The Guild of Women Binders in 1898. Largely self-taught in binding techniques, Constance became instrumental in the running of the Guild. At the age of twenty she exhibited several bindings at the 1900 Exposition Universelle in Paris. Many of her works - some designed by her and worked by other women, others, like this one, both designed and executed by her - were illustrated in *The Bindings of To-Morrow. A Record of the Work of the Guild of Women-Binders and of the Hampstead Bindery*, printed for the Guild in 1902. Tidcombe notes: 'Constance Karslake and Edith and Florence de Rheims began producing gold-tooled and onlaid bindings towards the end of 1900, although their more elaborate work of this kind dates from the following year. These three women became very able amateur finishers, and were responsible for much of the Guild's best work ...'. Provenance: The Dr J. Singer library stamp is that of Isidor Singer (1857-1927), an Austrian journalist, statistician and newspaper editor. He came from a wealthy Jewish textile merchant family who had lived in Vienna since 1861. After studying law, mathematics and natural sciences in Vienna and Graz, he received his doctorate in law in Vienna in 1881. Carl Menger assisted with Singer's *Habilitation* in 1885, then qualifying as a professor at the University of Vienna and becoming a private lecturer in statistics; and from 1892 onwards an extraordinary professor of statistics. Also in 1885, he published *Untersuchungen über die socialen zustände in den fabrikbezirken des nordöstlichen Böhmen; ein beitrag zur methodik socialstatistischer beobachtung* ('Investigations into the Social Conditions of Northeastern Bohemia. A Contribution to the Method of Social-Statistical Investigations'). In the 1880s, Singer critically examined the emergence of modern anti-Semitism in Germany and Austria.

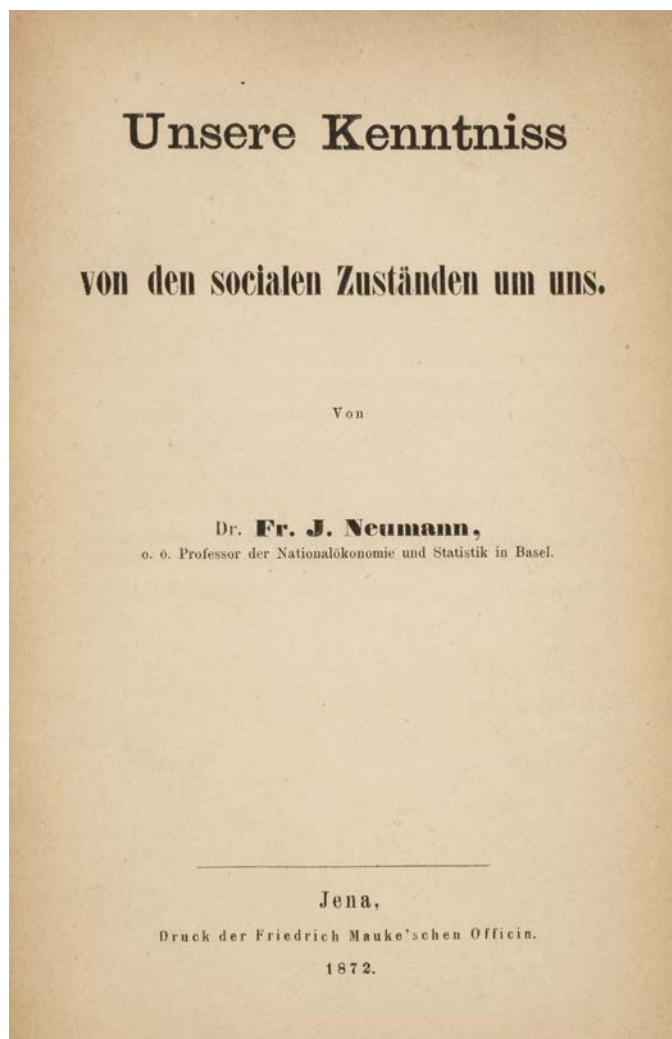

Rare first edition of Menger's revolutionary work in economics and the foundation of the Austrian School. Having arrived at the marginal utility theory independently of, but at the same time as, William Stanley Jevons and Léon Walras, Menger's *Grundsätze* extended it to indirect goods and complementary goods, integrating marginal utility theory into value and price theory. According to Joseph Schumpeter, Menger extended 'the range of the principle of marginal utility over the whole area of production and distribution ... the whole organon of pure economics thus finds itself unified in the light of a single principle — in a sense in which it never had before' (Schumpeter, *History of Economic Analysis*, p. 913).

'... In somewhat copious but always clear language, it [Grundsätze] provided a more thorough account of the relations between utility, value, and price than is found in any of the works by Jevons and Walras, who at about the same time laid the foundation of the "marginal revolution" in economics' (Friedrich von Hayek, in IESS).

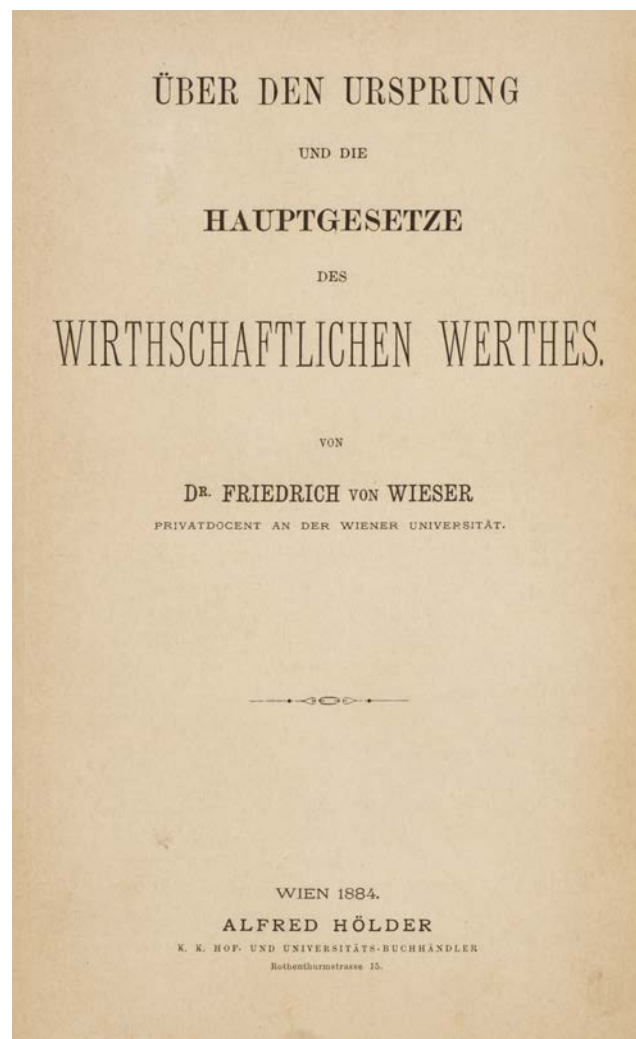

Friedrich Julius von Neumann (1835-1910) was a German economist. His father was the physicist Franz Ernst Neumann, and two of his brothers were the pathologist and founder of haematology, Ernst Neumann, and the mathematician, Carl Gottfried Neumann.

Neumann studied political science and law in Königsberg and Leipzig, and was appointed professor of economics at the University of Basel in 1871. In 1873, he moved to the Albert Ludwig University of Freiburg. From 1876 to 1909, he held the chair of economics at the University of Tübingen. Neumann worked on formulating the 'fundamentals of economics'. He was, along with Adolph Wagner, one of the first German financial theorists. He also took an interest in socio-political issues. This rare offprint, ('Our knowledge of the social conditions around us'), was originally published in Hildebrand's *Jahrbücher für Nationalökonomie und Statistik*, XVIII Bd. 4. u. 5. Heft.

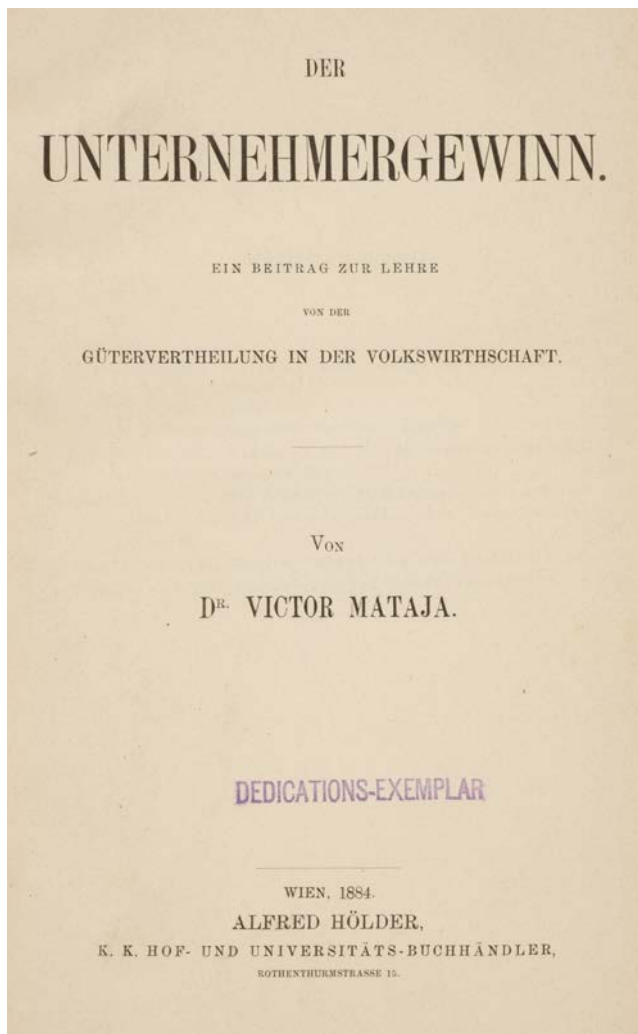

Provenance: The Dr J. Singer library stamp is that of Isidor Singer (1857-1927), an Austrian journalist, statistician and newspaper editor. For more information see Menger, above.

Friedrich von Wieser (1851-1926) was one of the leading exponents of the Austrian school of economics. Together with his fellow student and brother-in-law Eugen von Böhm-Bawerk, he developed the ideas of Carl Menger and made the Austrian school of marginal utility widely known. This is his first published work, and one in which Wieser introduced the term *Grenznutzen* ('marginal utility'). The book, 'On the Origin and Main Laws of Economic Value', met with little response outside Vienna, but earned him a professorship in Prague. 'Here he continued to work on the same problems and also on what he regarded merely as a first step toward a theory of value that was to be fully developed in *Der natürliche Werth* (1889). He employed the expository device of studying value in a centrally directed economy and suggested possible applications of utility theory to public finance. The book gained him almost immediate acclaim, and it was soon translated into English' (Friedrich von Hayek, in IESS).

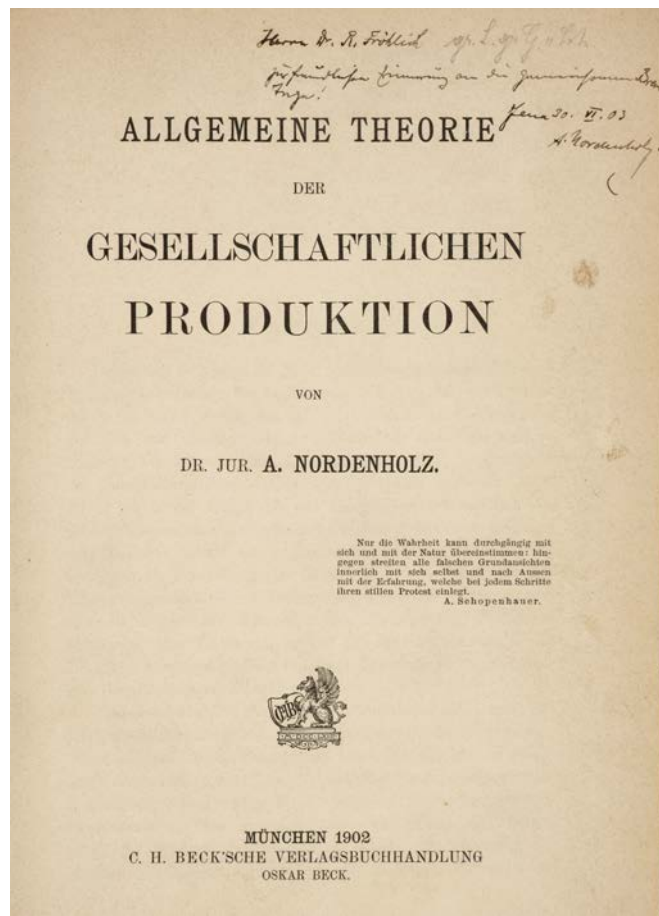

Viktor Mataja (1857–1934) was an Austrian economist and social politician. A student of Carl Menger, and part of the Austrian School of Economics, this is a good copy of his rare first book, ('Entrepreneurial Profit. A Contribution to the Theory of the Distribution of Goods in Economics'). According to Mataja, entrepreneurial profit is the income which 'results entirely from economic exchange and which furthermore accrues to the owner of the business venture absolutely and exclusively'.

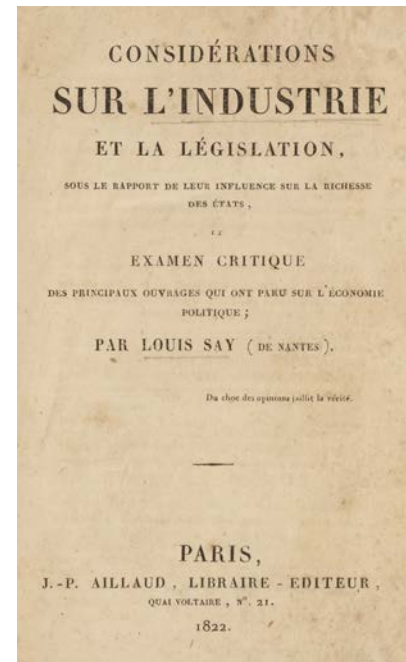
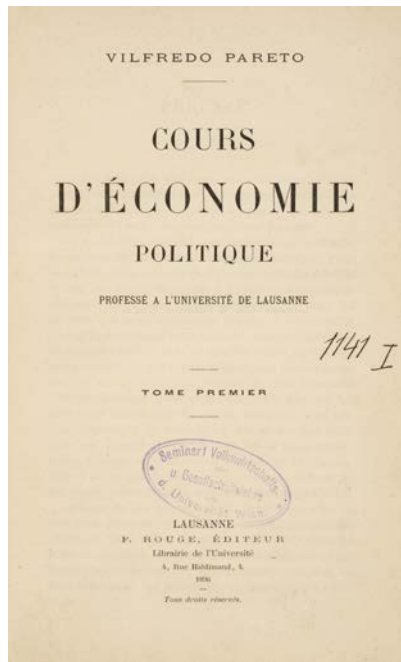

Provenance: The dedicatee is Dr Richard Fröhlich, a Viennese physician who had started to propagate total sobriety among Vienna's workers. It would appear from the presentation inscription that Nordenholz met Fröhlich there.

Anastasius Nordenholz (1862–1953) was born in Buenos Aires, Argentina, moving to Germany as a teenager where he studied law, political economics and philosophy in Berlin, Zurich and Jena. This uncommon title, his first published book, ('General Theory of Production in Society'), concerns political economics, with a focus on the science of human thinking and knowledge.

1) Rare first edition of volume 1 of Pareto's first major work; volume 2 was published in 1897. Pareto was one of the leaders of the Lausanne School and an illustrious member of the 'second generation' of the Neoclassical revolution. The *Cours d'économie politique* contains his famous 'law' of income distribution, a complicated mathematical formulation in which Pareto attempted to prove that the distribution of incomes and wealth in society is not random and that a consistent pattern appears throughout history, in all parts of the world and in all societies.

2) First edition of Wolowski's edition of two important early works on monetary theory. Oresme's original mid-14th century treatise on monetary debasement is considered by many as the first work entirely devoted to an economic problem.

3) Paul Karl Mombert (1876-1938) was a German economist. He studied economics in Heidelberg, Leipzig, Berlin, and Munich. In 1902, he received his doctorate in economics from Lujo Brentano. In 1906, he habilitated at the University of Freiburg and was authorised to teach economics, public finance, and statistics at the Faculty of Law and Political Science. There, he initially worked as a private lecturer and, from 1911, as an adjunct professor. Inspired by Brentano, he studied population theory and policy, and, through his colleague Karl Diehl, he studied the history of dogma, economic theory and financial science.
